



A LOCAL NOTE FOR YOUR STAY

Brockville, Gently Recommended

A few personal suggestions for guests with time before or after their A 1000 Ways experience. This is not an exhaustive guide. It is a quieter way into the city: coffee, river air, a proper walk, heritage context, the arts, active time, and dinner.

Start the day well Sweet Ofelia Cafe for a polished local cafe stop, Cosies for a traditional British tea room, and Pau Hana Coffee for a good coffee. On Saturday mornings, the Brockville Farmers' Market is worth a stop.	The river and a local walk Blockhouse Island is the place I would send you first for river views close to downtown. For a longer stretch, use the Brock Trail to move through the city at an easier pace.
Heritage, arts and context Brockville Railway Tunnel is one of the city's most memorable stops. Add Courthouse Avenue, Fulford Place or the Brockville Museum for more context, and check the Brockville Arts Centre for what is on locally.	See Brockville from the water Dive Brockville Adventure Centre offers smaller one-hour boat rides, while traditional sightseeing cruises leave from the downtown waterfront. Kayak and paddleboard rentals are also available seasonally. Advance booking is recommended.
Local food stops Hall's Apple Market is a longstanding local stop for apples, cider, baked goods and seasonal produce. Tincap Berry Farm is another favourite for fresh berries, vegetables and farm-market finds. Check seasonal hours before visiting.	Lunch & Dinner For a relaxed waterfront meal, Don's Fish & Chips is a Brockville institution. The Noshery offers seasonal dishes in an intimate setting, while 1000 Islands Restaurant & Pizzeria remains a longstanding local favourite with an easy, familiar feel.
